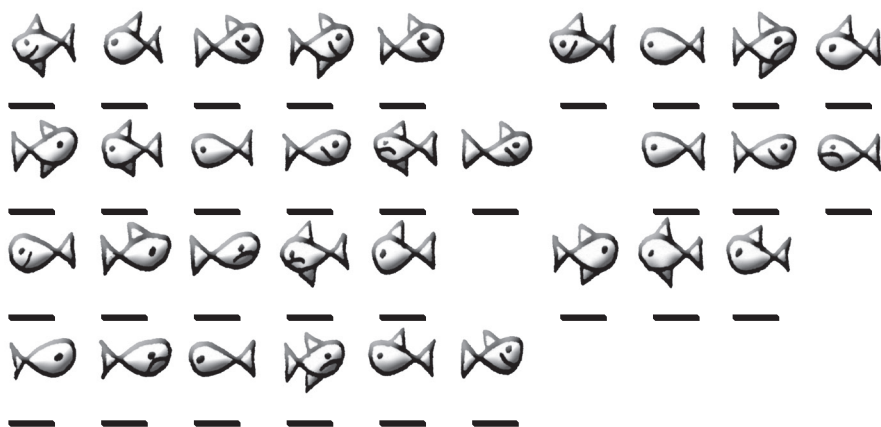
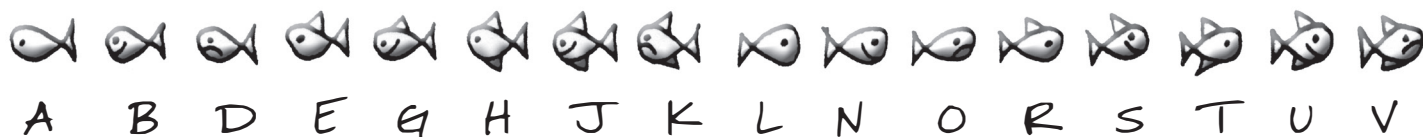


Feeding 5000 people!

Solve the code to find what Jesus did



Mark 6:30-46
John 6:8-9

Can you find
5 loaves and 2 fish
hidden in this picture?

A Bible Sum

(the answers can be found in Mark 6 v 30-44)

If your Bible says that it could cost 200 pence to feed everyone, you need to know that a man would earn 25 pence in a month. $25 \text{ pence} \times 8 = 200 \text{ pence}$.

Add the number of months' wages it would take to

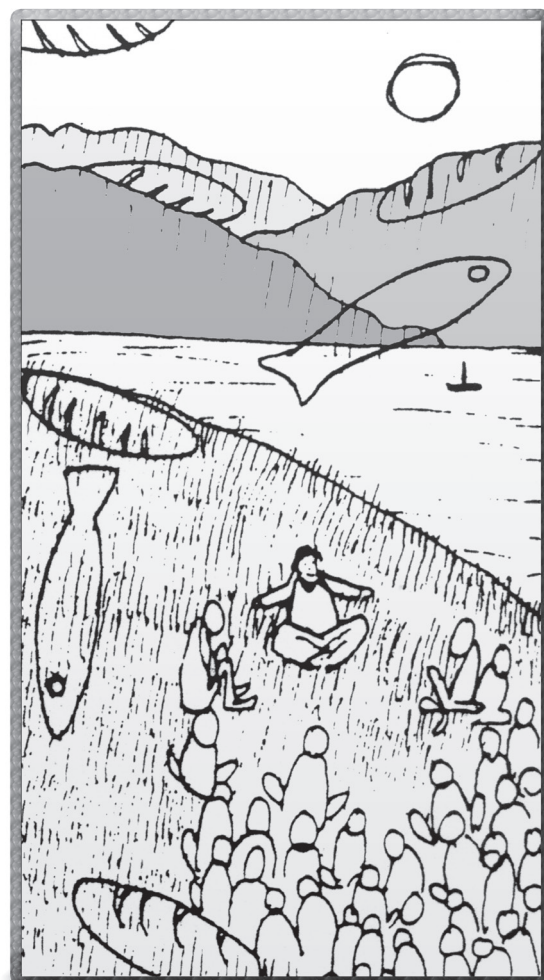
feed the crowd (v37) **to** the number of baskets used to collect the leftover pieces of bread (v43).

Multiply the total by the number of loaves brought to Jesus (v41)

Multiply this number by the number of fish (v41) Take away the number of the larger groups into which the people were divided (v40), then

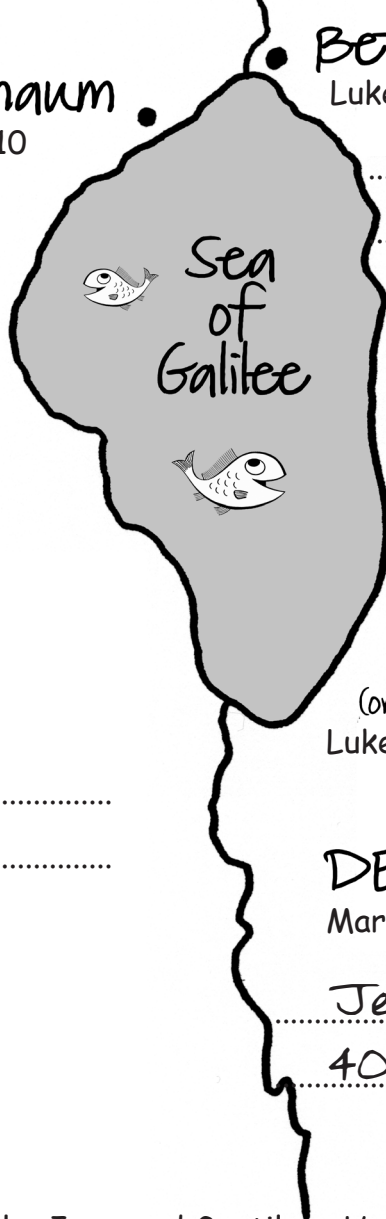
Multiply by the number of the smaller groups (v40).

Your answer should be the number given in verse 44!



What happened in Galilee?

When Jesus fed the 5000 men they were probably Jews because this was a Jewish place.

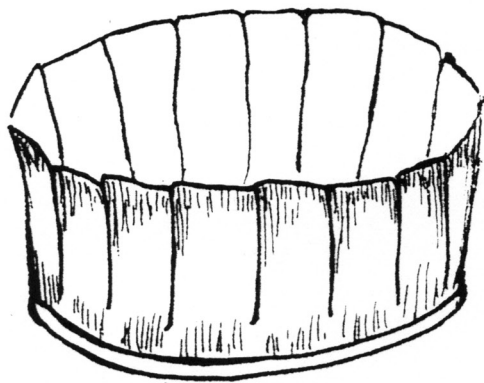

While you read this story think how Jesus can give us everything we need and not just bread. Notice who did not like this idea. Also notice who wanted to follow Jesus whatever he said.

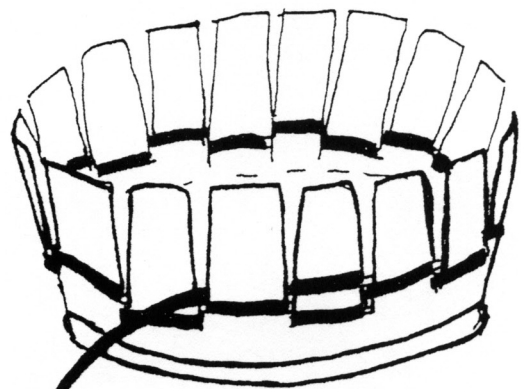
A basket for crumbs

You will need

- A small round plastic **Carton** (cottage cheese or coleslaw container or margarine tub)
- Brown **Wool**
- **Playdough**, plasticene or something similar
- **Tissue**



Cut
Off
the
firm
top
edge
of the
container



then cut down to
within 5 mm of the bottom at
about 1 cm intervals making
sure that you end up with an
odd number of flaps.

With brown wool **weave** in
and out of the flaps, securing the
wool at the beginning with glue or a knot. Continue weaving up to
the top. Place a piece of tissue inside.

Make 5 loaves and 2 fish out of plasticene small enough to fit
into the basket.
