The Ethiopian's scroll

Lesson 122 - Craft Activity



You will need:

1. 2 pieces of dowel about 18 cm long
2. Paper or thin card 12 cm wide and at least 30 cm long
3. Beads, thick card, glue and pens

What to do:

1. Fasten a piece of dowel to each end of the paper with glue or staples. Roll the two pieces of wood to the centre to make a closed scroll.
2. Open the scroll and write the passage the Ethiopian was reading.
3. To finish the scroll handles, cut four small card circles and glue them to the ends of the dowel. Glue beads onto the card circles.
