Peter and the transfiguration

What was one of the first things the disciples learnt about Jesus? John 1:29

But we know that the disciples found it difficult to understand that Jesus had to die.

Look at another time that Jesus tried to tell them about his approaching death. Matthew 16:21-23

Why do you think Jesus called Peter a stumbling block?

- 1. He thought he was stupid not to understand
- 2. He thought Peter was a devil ('Satan' just means an adversary)
- 3. It was a difficult time for Jesus and he didn't want Peter opposing him

What happened next? Matthew 17:1-9

What was Jesus talking to Moses and Elijah about? Luke 9:30-31

Do you think this would have encouraged Jesus?

Do you think it would have made Peter think?

Read what Peter wrote some followers many years later. 2 Peter 1:16-18

What do you think he was trying to tell them?

[As they were coming down the mountain the disciples asked Jesus about Elijah and Jesus likens him to John the Baptist. You might like to do a study to compare Moses, Elijah and John]

Look in a hymn book for hymns about the breaking of bread. Hymns are like prayers. What do they tell you about the feelings people have about the breaking of bread service?
