

In this lesson we will find out about Paul's arrest. There is more to the story though: we can look at what motivated the people around him, and how people can get carried away with doing something.

What did the commander do?


How did Paul avoid being flogged?

What did the commander arrange the next day?

In Acts 22, who is being carried along by the crowd?

Now look at these passages, and identify which picture goes with each one.




When we talk of someone being or getting carried away we don't literally mean they are carried off. What does the phrase mean?

What does being carried away by something imply about the motives or the responsibility of the person who has got carried away?

Is being carried away something which is pre-planned?

What do you think were the motives behind the actions of each of these groups?
Discuss your ideas then write a list for each one.



What can we be carried away by?

Do you think you would ever be carried along and end up doing something you thought was wrong?

Make a list of strategies to try to avoid being carried along by things.

When Jesus was tempted in the wilderness, his thorough knowledge of the Bible helped him to avoid succumbing to the temptations. His attitude to life and his motivation meant he had the strength to do the right thing.

It's the same when we are at risk of being carried along by a crowd: if our underlying attitudes are right and we have built up a good basis for doing right, then we will have more strength to stand our ground.

Digging Deeper

The Sanhedrin

The Sanhedrin was the highest Jewish court in New Testament times. It had 70 elders who had to be Jewish and of noble descent, and a High Priest who was the president. They sat in a semi circle with their disciples behind them. In the Authorised Version it is called the Council.
