

Christine communicates with Sunday schools, sends out physical orders and keeps an eye on stock levels so she can order updates and reprinting of materials.

Bro Andrew Walker

Andrew is single handedly responsible for creating and maintaining our current website, keeps track of committee IT requirements and also looks after printing.

Bro Ben Willey Treasurer

Ben manages the finances of the Union, which includes preparing financial information for the CSSU trustees, delivering annual accounts to the Charities Commission & chasing unpaid bills!

Sis Anna MacDonald

Helps with proofreading, screening and recording the Annual Teachers' Forum and is a great source of new project ideas, including creating Farsi teaching resources. We are always looking for fresh faces on the committee - especially those with experience of producing learning materials, digital communications and design. The commitment is not onerous but essential to keep our contributions relevant for the students of the future.

What is the CSSU? A look back in time...

It may surprise you to know that it all began back in 1907. At that time apparently, ecclesias made financial contributions based on the number of scholars in their school, and after some rather complex calculations the largest school, Erdington (64 scholars) contributed 7 shillings a year, while Cardiff, with 20 children, contributed 2 shillings and 8 pence!! The number of affiliated schools grew year by year: in 1912 there were 23 in Britain, teaching 640 children, as well as three in Canada and one in what is now known as Guyana, where 70 scholars regularly attended.

In 1933 the syllabus was born; a plan of consecutive lessons covering six years for the Intermediate and Senior age groups, and also a three-year plan for younger children. Formal examinations were held annually and league tables produced!! In 1924, Corby ecclesia (long-since closed), topped the table with an astonishing 96.5% - slightly less surprising when you learn they had only two scholars.

In 2003, regular 'Quiz weeks' replaced the exams, and students everywhere breathed a sigh of relief!

Ever since then there has been a continuous effort to provide the very best lesson materials for our children and young people in a changing and increasingly challenging world, and the CSSU now offers 82 different publications to meet the needs of children from the ages of four to twenty.

All of the lesson materials and some of the other resources are free to download, as well as hard copies to purchase.

What do the CSSU do?

Lesson materials

You are probably familiar with our teaching notes and student's workbooks, which provide a syllabus that informs and guides the teaching of children from 3 to around 16 years old. These materials are updated on a cyclical basis prior to a new print run and as well as paper copies for purchase, are freely available to download from our website (especially useful at 9pm on a Saturday night!!)

We also stock prize labels and support materials for youth leaders such as Flying Starts with multi-age starter activities, and the The Youth Leader's Handbook - which gives guidance on setting up a Sunday School or CYC from scratch, or running youth events such as Holiday clubs or camps.

Reading books/prize materials

Some of you may have given our books as prizes or even read them yourselves. We have a wide range such as the long-running Dan's Diary for older primary children, but there have also been more contemporary releases in recent years aimed at teenagers, such as Hannah Hayles's popular series of Old Testament character stories and the comic-style Wanderful Years and Whistle-Stop Gospel.

If you know a child who enjoyed reading these, why not ask them to submit a review to the next newsletter?

We have also produced a couple of card games, Bible Top Trumps and Happy Bible Families (created by the young people of Reading ecclesia), which make great holiday games or stocking fillers.

These and other materials are available from our website and some are stocked by the Christadelphian Office.

Magazines

We oversee and fund the production of magazines for children mainly in this country but also in some CBMsupported countries too. These began back in 1906 with snappily-titled The Young Folks' Magazine.

We are so grateful to the hard-working editors of all 3 magazines – Anne Botten (My Sunday School Magazine), Claire and Joel Galilee and Phoebe Genders (Bible Explorers) and Becky Lewis and Julie Snowbelen (The Word). They offer age-appropriate articles and activities to cement and augment Sunday School or family spiritual teaching in a fun way.

From our own experience, we are conscious that often children need encouragement to read the magazines and participate in any competitions. Please do try to think of ways to use them in your Sunday Schools so we can all benefit from their varied approaches. If you don't read them yourselves already, you may be pleasantly surprised at the material covered.

Any feedback from you as teachers or from the children about these magazines is always appreciated by CSSU and especially the editors themselves.

Safeguarding support

An important aspect of our work is in helping ecclesias provide good, up to date safeguarding policies and encouraging brothers and sisters to be DBS checked. Further in the newsletter is a section dedicated to explaining how vital this is.

Website

Since the original website was set up by Andrew Walker in 1995 it has been an essential access point for most of our resources above; it also holds a library of plays for Sunday School events. Having been managed faithfully by brother Andrew ever since, we have been working for some time to revamp it and ensure it is future-proofed.

Jered Bolton from Bristol Downend has been working on this and the changeover is due to take place very soon, hopefully seamlessly. We trust you will find any differences beneficial but we do of course welcome any feedback from you, positive or negative, so we can make it work well for all of us.

Newsletter

Over the last 3 years, we have been sending out newsletters like this one, with the aim being to inform teachers about CSSU matters, but also to encourage the sharing of ideas either through this newsletter or directly, or between one Sunday School and another, especially if schools are physically close or if smaller ones could benefit from the support of larger ones. It is this we hope to address in our next Teachers' Forum.

Teachers Forum

The first CSSU Annual Conference was held in 1921 and became a regular event, providing a valuable opportunity for teachers to learn from each other and to comment on the future direction of CSSU work.

With gradual falling attendance and then the Covid pandemic of 2020 it has been held online as the Teachers' Forum and AGM. Talks are provided aimed at various ages and the discussion time can be a really uplifting way to support each other in the challenges of teaching our young people in the current age.

If you have missed them, all talks from the past 3 years are available as recordings and can be useful for teacher training sessions or personal inspiration! Contact sis Caz if you'd like access to these.

If you have been before, do spread the word and if you have not been able to attend, then why not put 4th October 2025 in your diary - we would love to see you there for the first time!

News from the CSSU

New Website!

We are hoping for our new site, to be launched soon, God willing. The current one was built 20 years ago and is showing its age.

Much of the new site should look like the current one, and downloading lessons etc. will be as easy as it is now. But there are some improvements that we hope you will like, which should make life easier for us all.

We will continue to provide books free of charge where they are supporting the preaching work of the CBM, and to give discounts in other cases to support our community at large. Safeguarding reminder

With the Church of England hierarchy yet again in the news recently regarding safeguarding failures, we thought it was timely to remind our readers of why safeguarding really matters.

It protects the vulnerable in our community

Protection of those who cannot protect themselves, is a theme which runs through scripture like the lettering in a stick of rock.

Learn to do good, seek justice, rebuke the oppressor, defend the fatherless, plead for the widow...Isaiah 1:17

He will bring justice to the poor of the people; He will save the children of the needy, and will break in pieces the oppressor... Psalm 72:4

It shows others that we care for the vulnerable

A child protection policy contains a number of measures that show all parents that we will do our best to ensure the safety of their children. Paul advised that those who perform roles in the ecclesia must be well regarded, even by non-members.

They must have a good report of them that are without... 1 Timothy 3v7

It means we are caring for all the vulnerable as much as we would want to be cared for ourselves

This means applying Christ's principle of doing for others what we would like them to do for us.

So in everything, do to others what you would have them do to you... Matthew 7:12

What should our ecclesia be doing?

- Ensure that we have a child protection and vulnerable adult policy
- Appoint a DSL (designated safeguarding lead) and ensure all members and children know who that person is
- Check the CSN website (Christadelphian Support Network) for latest advice and policy templates on protecting the vulnerable
- Keep reviewing and updating our safeguarding measures
