My Sunday School Magazine for ages 3-6 is edited by Anne Botten.


"My Sunday School

way to serve the community that is fun, creative, and fits into our often chaotic lives.





Our aim is to create a fun, relevant and interactive resource, with a variety of activities to generate excitement about the stories and lessons. Our ultimate aim, especially for older children, is for the magazine to prompt them to open and explore their own Bibles outside of a Sunday school lesson.'

The Word for ages 11-14 had a hiatus for a couple of years when we couldn't recruit an editor, so we were grateful when sis Becky Lewis stepped up to revive it!

'The Word magazine is published three times a year (in digital and printed formats). We aim to make the magazine accessible to everyone, whatever their background or level of Bible knowledge.

Quick Teaching Tips

Ways to use the magazines in Sunday School:

- Ask the children to bring one new thing they have learned from their magazine to the next class
- Challenge your children to complete a competition but offer prizes for the 'in house' winner(s)
- Write an article from their lesson in the style of the magazine - they could even submit it to the editors for inclusion in a future edition!
