Activities and Games

Activity 1: The 'Paul' Files (30 mins)

Aim

To consider and revise the reasons why Paul was on trial

Equipment needed

- One photocopy of the worksheet per student
- Pens
- One Bible each

Instructions

- 1. Explain that the students are to imagine that they are Festus' right-hand people (Acts 25:23). The aim of the task is to consider the allegations against Paul and then to try to evaluate the evidence. The report from Acts would have been sent to Caesar in Rome. (Acts25:27).
- 2. Ask students to select one of the people or groups below:

Sanhedrin Acts 23 Acts 23 Ananias, High Priest The Jerusalem 'Plotters' Acts 21 and 23 Commander of the Roman troop Acts 21-23 Tertullus, the lawyer Acts 24 Felix and Drusilla Acts 24 Porcius Festus Acts 24-25 King Agrippa and Bernice Acts 25-26

Students should write this name as their 'Name of Witness'

- Give the students 10 minutes to produce their 'case' against Paul.
 One by one, students should read their witness' allegation and evidence. Decide the reliability of this evidence and complete the forms.
- 5. The class should imagine they are Roman rulers in Rome and have a strong interest in keeping the peace.
- 6. Look at each form and ask the students to decide whether, in their view, the evidence is reliable.
- 7. If some students finish stage 3 before the others they could spend time designing an official stamp or seal for the documents.
- 8. Display the work.

For I think it is unreasonable to send a prisoner without specifying the charges against him. (Acts 25:26-27)



Activity 2: Shipwreck! (15 mins)

Aim

To create a time line of Paul's journey to Rome

Equipment needed

- A copy of the Shipwreck map enlarged if possible or make a rough copy on a large piece of paper.
- A copy of the Events sheet intact to check as the sorting progresses.
- A copy of the Events sheet cut into individual events slips with the numbers removed.
- Pens or pencils

Instructions

- 1. Spread the map out on the floor or a large table.
- 2. Mix the events slips up and put them face down on the floor or table.
- 3. Explain that the students are going to create Paul's 'shipwreck' journey but they have to get the events in the correct order or Paul might not get there.
- 4. The students take it in turns to take a slip, read it and place it on one of the numbered spots.
- 5. Give the others a chance to say whether or not they agree that this is the right spot. They have to give a reason if they don't agree like 'they wouldn't have thrown the cargo out in the harbour'
- 6. Move the slip if everyone agrees.
- 7. Continue taking it in turns to place a slip and discuss. It will probably be necessary to move previously placed slips as they get the journey sorted.

Hints for teacher

It will probably be useful to have the correct order in front of you so that you can offer suggestions and ask questions as you progress to stop the journey getting into a horrible muddle.

Depending on the class you might not be too fussy about the order of events during the storm. Below is the correct order.
